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Constitution

(First devised and formatted at 2006 AGM)

1. Name

The name of the Association will be the 'Brisbane School Girls' Sports Association'.

2. Members

Catholic Secondary Girls' Schools and other Schools in Greater Brisbane Area upon application to the Administrative / Management Committee and agreed at the AGM.

3. Committee

The Principal of each affiliated school shall appoint a representative for each school (Sports Co-ordinator/ teacher) by notice in writing and those representatives shall form the committee of the Association.

4. Objectives

The objectives of the Association shall be to foster sport amongst the affiliated schools by:

- providing team sporting competitions for girls
- team sports to include:
 - Volleyball
 - Cricket
 - AFL
 - Netball
 - Hockey
 - Soccer
 - Touch Football
 - Basketball
- fostering other competitions as agreed to by the committee of the Association

The Age Divisions or Age Groupings for each sport shall be determined and confirmed every two / three years at the AGM.

5. Affiliation Fees

The affiliation fee as determined by the Association's AGM in November, shall be paid annually by member schools. This fee will be paid upon receipt of an account from the Treasurer.

*Amendment to Pt 5 (agreed to by Principals after Nov Agm 2007) for each participating school to pay their nomination fees within two weeks of commencement of competition; nomination fees to be determined based on previous years accounts.

6. Office Bearers

The Office Bearers of the Association shall be:

- Host School: The Host School is appointed annually by rotation from a member school of the Association.
- President – The host school principal appointed annually, by rotation, from a member school of the Association.

- Administrative Officer
- Treasurer – appointed annually from nominated member schools

7. Duties of Office Bearers

- (a) Duties of President
 - (i) to preside over the AGM of the Association.
 - (ii) to call extraordinary meetings as deemed necessary
- (b) Duties of Administrative Officer
 - (i) implement BSGSA policies
 - (ii) liaise regularly with school and sports coordinators
 - (iii) organise AGM and Nomination Meetings each year
 - (iv) organise playing venues for netball, hockey and touch football
 - (v) organise and structure (fixtures) competition in volleyball, cricket, AFL, netball, hockey, touch football, soccer, Basketball and softball
 - (vi) Record results and standings for each level of competition and sport across the year
 - (vii) organise 'Finals Day' for Hockey, Netball, Touch Football
 - (viii) provide details regarding invoices to the treasurer for all charges incurred during the year
 - (ix) liaise with the treasurer to structure and organise accounts for BSGSA
 - (x) update documents and records on behalf of the BSGSA
 - (xi) report (written) to the AGM.. To attend all meetings, AGM and nomination
 - (xii) to give notice of all meetings, 21 days in advance
 - (xii) to receive proposals submitted 14 days prior to a meeting and prepare an agenda for all meetings
 - (xiii) to take minutes of each meeting and distribute two copies to member schools, one for the Principal and the Sports Co ordinator
 - (xiv) to order presentation pennants and certificates

- (b) Duties of Treasurer
 - (i) to attend to all financial matters and to maintain the financial records
 - (ii) to order presentation pennants / certificates
 - (iii) to distribute to member schools the accounts / invoices for affiliation and all sports levies
 - (iv) to present a report to the AGM
 - (v) to present an audited report at the AGM
 - (vi) to maintain an 'on call' account in the name of the Association. All cheques drawn will require the signature of two of the following: President, Vice-President, Administrative Officer , Treasurer
 - (vii) to keep an inventory of all equipment belonging to the Association

- (c) Auditor
 - (i) an auditor, elected at any meeting of the Association, shall examine and audit all accounts of the Association prior to the AGM

- (d) Association Meetings
- (e) an Association meeting shall consist of the Principal and sports Co ordinator from member schools and associate schools.
 - (i) there is be an Annual General Meeting each year (Wednesday following the last week of competition in Trimester 3)
 - (ii) there is to be one meeting of 60 minutes duration at the beginning of each trimester each year (February / May / August)
 - (iii) written notification of Association meetings shall be given by the Secretary / Administration Officer at least 21 days prior to the meeting.
 - (iv) Nomination Meetings shall consist of the Sports Co ordinator and the Administrative Officer. Further meetings may be convened at any time deemed necessary by the Administrative Officer
 - (v) prior to the AGM, Sports Co ordinators might meet to prepare recommendations on matters relating to sporting fixtures. Such recommendations shall be notified in writing to the member schools for discussion at the AGM
 - (vi) dates, venues and sporting fixtures are to discussed and finalized at the Nomination meetings and confirmed at the AGM.

- (f) Voting Powers
 - (i) at Association meetings, each member school shall have one vote.
 - (ii) all decisions will be taken by simple majority
 - (iii) in the event of a tied vote, the motion lapses.
 - (iv) To be classified as a "core" school a school needs to participate in a minimum of 4 of the offered sports competitions. *(amendment Nov 2007)

- (g) Quorum
 - (i) to constitute a quorum, no less than half the total number of member schools shall be required at each Association meeting.

- (h) Sub-committees

sports sub-committees may be constituted at the discretion of the Association meetings. Such committees are accountable and must report to the next Association meeting.

(i) Competition Rules

(i) rules governing sporting competitions shall be as set down in the Official International Rule Book for that particular Sport, unless the Association has modified these rules for the purpose of its competition.

(ii) any rule changes to the Official Rule Book shall be agreed upon by the Association at the AGM each year.

(iii) rules modified during the year / fixtures might be accepted in extraordinary circumstances as deemed by the Administrative Officer / Secretary and members of the Association. These changes would need to be ratified at the next AGM.

(j) Amendments to the Constitution

This Constitution may be amended at the AGM, or special Association meeting called for the purpose, provided that the required Notice of Motion in writing has been given to the Administrative Officer / Secretary of the Association

History

The BSGSA began in 1996 through the efforts of a small number of Catholic girls schools in Brisbane. Whilst there were sports organised on weekends through some school and club competitions, there was little comparative team sports for girls during the week.

Under the care of Catholic girls schools, namely, All Hallows, Mt St Michael's College, Mt Alvernia College, St John Fisher College, Our Lady's College, Stuartholme School, Brigidine College and San Sisto College, competitions were organised in Netball, Touch Football and Soccer. Whilst the BSGSA has been predominately a competition involving Catholic Girls College, a number of independent girls and co-educational schools have also participated and contributed to the standard of competition over the years.

Since 1996, with approximately 8 teams in Netball, Touch Football, and Soccer, the BSGSA has enjoyed growth each year as the needs have arisen. Loreto joined BSGSA in 2009.

Philosophy

The primary focus of all sports organised under the auspices of the BSGSA is that of 'participation.' As the formation of the BSGSA was to provide team competition for all girls' school wishing to participate, its motto, 'participation in excellence' was adopted in 1998. Therefore our guiding principles are:

- The promotion of girls sport;
- Enhanced opportunities for participation in elite, competitive and recreational sport and physical activity;
- Accessibility to a diverse range of programs;
- The fostering of individual talents, team spirit and commitment;
- The pursuit of excellence;
- A commitment to the highest standard of ethical behaviour;
- A commitment to the promotion of health and well being of all girls.

Administrative structures, processes and competition guidelines have been designed with these principles in mind. The standard of play and competitive spirit are important elements of all sporting competition, however, the BSGSA will always promote participation in sport by girls' as its key focus.

Organisation

While the organisation has a constitution to guide it, the structure and administration of the BSGSA is based loosely around a consensus model. There is no committee structure, but rather, the schools employ an administrative officer to undertake the association's affairs and schools employ sports coordinators to organise and implement the policies and guidelines as agreed to by the participating schools.

Schools participating within the nominated sports are invited to attend one Annual General Meeting (October) and three administrative meetings per year (TBA). The primary focus of these meetings is to discuss and decide upon guidelines, financial matters, draws, organisational factors and competitive sport rule changes.

Each of the schools is invited to send a representative to the meetings with each sports coordinator being able to speak and vote on behalf of their school. If voting is required to decide

an issue, then each school has one vote, with a clear majority to be reached before any changes are to be made.

BSGSA Code of Conduct

Sport plays an important part in the life of a school and of its students. Equally important to us all is the way the game is played and the way in which our sportswomen conduct themselves. The BSGSA code of conduct will ensure that our students develop good sporting behaviours and have an enjoyable experience of sport.

The Australian Sports Commission (ASC) has produced literature which outlines standards of behaviour recommended as appropriate for children in sport. The ASC literature formed a basis for the preparation of the BSGSA code of conduct. Care has been taken to present the BSGSA code of conduct in a constructive way, encapsulating the existing culture of girls' sport within independent girls' schools.

The BSGSA code of conduct outlines the key principles on which the schools, team players, coaches and staff, spectators and parents should base their sporting involvement. It outlines standards of behaviour recommended for all participants in BSGSA. The BSGSA code of conduct should be endorsed and adopted by all members.

SCHOOL

The school will, at all times, aim to participate in BSGSA in the spirit in which the association was formed and in the spirit of The Guiding Principles.

The school will, at all times, aim to adhere to all rules and regulations as determined by the Committee of Management of BSGSA from time to time, as set out in this handbook/document and amended from time to time.

The school will act as good and welcoming hosts to other schools.

The school will be respectful of all traditions and rules when visiting host schools and other sporting venues.

The school will ensure that all staff, coaches and volunteers working in the BSGSA program are suitably qualified to work with adolescent children in sport.

The school will not approach another school's team members with the purpose of securing those team members for their own school in the future. This would be deemed highly unethical.

TEAM MEMBERS

Team members will observe the highest standards of sportsmanship at all times.

Team members will:

- Perform to the best of their ability at all times.
- Accept without question the decisions of umpires and officials.
- Shake hands at the completion of all matches.
- Give three cheers for the other teams and the umpires at the conclusion of matches.
- Be gracious in victory and defeat.
- Participate by the competition rules and regulations.
- Respect all participants in the game and treat them courteously. This includes fellow team members, opponents, umpires, spectators and officials.

Bad language, abuse and poor sportsmanship will not be tolerated and may result in the offending student being removed indefinitely from the competition. The BSGSA Executive Officer is to be notified by the Sports Coordinator of the school at which the offending student attends of any such incident and the BSGSA Committee of Management will address the matter.

COACHES & STAFF

Coaches and staff should aim to adhere, at all times, to the Guiding Principles, Rules and Regulations, Policies and Rules for their particular sport as set out in the BSGSA Handbook.

Coaches and staff will:

- Carry out their duties to the best of their ability at all times.
- Conduct themselves as appropriate role models for the students and maintain the highest standards of personal conduct at all times.
- Observe the highest standard of ethics and they will promote these high standards amongst their team members, spectators and officials.
- Endorse the ASC harassment free sport policy. Offensive, discriminatory, humiliating and intimidating behaviours will not be tolerated.
- Promote the highest standards of sportsmanship and conduct amongst their athletes and teams.
- Encourage and expect their players to adhere to the player's code of conduct at all times.
- Show appreciation for good performance by any athlete in an appropriate and encouraging manner.
- Accept without question the decisions of umpires and officials.
- Allow all players to play to their ability and will ensure that all players have an equal opportunity to participate in the game.
- Respect all participants in the competition and treat them courteously. This includes fellow coaches and staff, all players, umpires, spectators and officials.
- Encourage and expect their school's spectators to adhere to the spectators' code of conduct.

Coaches and staff will at all times aim to follow the correct procedure for dealing with a protest or non-adherence to the rules, regulations and policies of BSGSA. This procedure is clearly set out in the BSGSA handbook.

SPECTATORS

Spectators will:

- Observe the highest standard of sportsmanship and conduct at all times.
- Show appreciation for good performance by any athlete or team member in an appropriate and encouraging manner.

- Respect all participants in the sport competition and treat them courteously. This includes fellow spectators, athletes, umpires, coaches, staff and officials.
- Respect the traditions and rules of the schools and sporting venues which they visit and act accordingly.
- Accept without question the decisions of umpires and coaches.
- Respect and adhere to the rules and regulations of BSGSA.

PARENTS

Parents will:

- Aim to support and encourage their daughters in their participation in sport.
- Respect and support the ongoing commitment required of their daughter as a team member.
- Focus on their daughter's efforts and performance rather than winning or losing.
- Provide all necessary consents as reasonably required by BSGSA.

BREACHES OF CODE OF CONDUCT

- In the event of a breach of the BSGSA Code of Conduct, a referee/umpire, school staff member/coach or BSGSA Representative is empowered to sanction the offending person/persons appropriately including exclusion from the field of play or surrounds.

Risk Management Policy

BSGSA aims to ensure that all activities are managed and conducted in a safe environment. This policy provides a process for the safe management of sport. Whilst the key responsibility lies with the member schools, the following provides a generic guide for the establishment and implementation of a risk management process within schools when participating in BSGSA sporting events.

Weekly Sport

It is the named school's responsibility to set an emergency plan for the competition venue(s) so that the responsible action is taken in an emergency.

The emergency plan should include:

- The provision of an operable phone at each competition venue. The phone should be easily accessible
- Record of the venue location (specific) and emergency contact numbers should be posted near the phone.
- List of contact numbers, including after hours contacts, should be readily available.
- An assurance that Emergency vehicles have clear access to the playing area at all times

Sun & Heat Protection Policy

Many of the BSGSA activities will take place in hot, sunny weather. BSGSA aims to protect its staff and students from the effects of heat and exposure to the sun.

In addition to this policy, BSGSA has developed rules for the cancellation of sports in extreme heat.

This policy aims to increase the awareness of the dangers of overexposure to the heat and sun and to increase the levels of responsible behaviours in these matters.

The following strategies are recommended:

1. Schools should ensure that uniforms are suitable and that protective sun hats are worn in 1st and 4th term.
2. Schools should, where possible, ensure that adequate shade areas are provided at venues.
3. Staff should ensure that team officials provide appropriate modelling behaviour.
4. Staff should ensure the availability of sufficient drinking water at a venue.
5. Staff should encourage personal protection measures for students at all times, including:
 - The wearing of hats when in the sun
 - The use of broad spectrum sunscreen
 - The use of available shade areas
 - The drinking of fluid, prior to, during and after exercise.

Factors to consider during extreme heat:

- Dividing games into shorter periods to allow for extra drink breaks
- Provision of extra water for wetting face, clothes and hair
- Increasing airflow in indoor venues

Infectious Disease Policy

A number of blood-borne infectious diseases can be transmitted during body contact and collision sports. The more serious include Viral Hepatitis and HIV (AIDS) infections. It is important to remember that more common diseases, such as the “common cold”, flue and herpes simplex may spread during body contact sports.

These diseases may be spread by contact between broken skin or mucous membranes and infected:

- Blood
- Saliva (not HIV)
- Semen and vaginal fluids.

NB. There is no evidence that sweat, urine and tears will transmit Hepatitis B or HIV.

It is strongly recommended that all participants, coaches and officials in BSGSA be informed of this policy and adopt its commonsense recommendations to reduce the risk of transmitting infectious disease.

Players

1. Sharing of towels, face washers and drink containers must not occur.
2. All open cuts and abrasions must be reported and treated immediately.
3. It is the participant’s responsibility to maintain strict personal hygiene, as this is the best method of controlling the spread of these diseases.
4. It is strongly recommended that all participants involved in contact/collision sports be vaccinated against Hepatitis B
5. All participants with prior evidence of these diseases are strongly advised to obtain confidential advice and clearance from a doctor prior to participation.

Team Areas

1. It is the school’s responsibility to ensure that the toilet and change facilities are clean and tidy. Particular attention must be paid to the hand-basins, toilets and showers. Adequate soap, paper hand-towel, brooms, refuse disposal bins and disinfectants must be available at all times.
2. The practice of spitting must not be permitted.
3. All clothing, equipment and surfaces contaminated by blood must b treated as potentially infectious. Equipment and surfaces should be cleaned immediately if soiling or spills occur.

Procedure for on field treatment of bleeding wounds during the games:

1. If the player is bleeding, she should immediately leave the playing area to receive treatment (substitution may be made)
2. The player may return to the field once bleeding has been controlled, the wound covered and any blood contaminated clothing changed.
3. If the bleeding player does not leave the field voluntarily or when asked, the umpire may suspend her for misconduct.
4. If an area of the field/court becomes contaminated with blood the umpire must stop the game.

Recommendations when cleaning up blood and body substances:

- Gloves must be worn

- If the blood spill is large, confine and contain the spill.
- Remove the bulk of the blood and body substance with absorbent material, eg. Paper towels.
- Place the paper towels in a sealed plastic bag and dispose with normal rubbish. Clean the spill site with detergent solution.
- Wipe the site with disposable towels soaked in 1:10 solution bleach. (Hockey turf D soapy water with brush, rinse with water)
- Routine laundry procedures are adequate for the processing of all linen.
- Gloves should be worn when handling or washing soiled linen. General utility gloves can be used for this task. The gloves should be washed in detergent after use, or discarded if they are peeled, cracked, discoloured, torn, punctured or have other evidence of deterioration.
- Contaminated linen soiled with blood or body substances should be transported in a leak proof plastic bag to the laundry site simply to contain the body fluid and stop it spreading to the other laundry items. Contaminated linen does not need to be segregated in the hot detergent wash.

Umpires and Officials

1. It is strongly recommended that all personnel working in contact/collision sports be vaccinated against Hepatitis B.
2. Officials must report in writing all open cuts and abrasions to the responsible school staff member/coach at the first available opportunity.
3. All contaminated clothing and equipment must be replaced prior to the player being allowed to resume play.
4. If bleeding should recur, the above procedures must be repeated.
5. If bleeding cannot be controlled and the wound securely covered, the player must not continue in the game.

Coaches and Responsible Staff

1. If a skin lesion is observed, it must be immediately cleansed with suitable antiseptic and securely covered.
2. If a bleeding wound occurs, the individual's participation must be interrupted until the bleeding has been stopped and the wound is both rinsed with plenty of water and, if dirty, washed with soap and covered with a waterproof dressing.
3. Those attending to bleeding players should wear non-utility gloves, ie. Disposable latex or vinyl gloves, which must never be reused. These must be worn when direct contact is anticipated with blood or body substances, mucous membranes, or non-intact skin, as when attending to first aid of a bleeding player or handling items or contact surfaces contaminated with blood or body substances. Gloves must be changed and discarded:
 - As soon as they are torn or punctured
 - After contact with each player.

Hands must be washed after removal and disposal of gloves.

4. Disposable resuscitation devices should be available and accessible. They should be used for anyone requiring mouth-to-mouth cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

Education

1. There is an obligation on all relevant staff to provide suitable information on the associated risk factors and prevention strategies against these diseases.

2. The safe handling of contaminated clothing, equipment and surfaces must be brought to the attention of all players and associated staff.
3. Although Hepatitis B vaccination is usually effective in raising immunity to Hepatitis B, it provides no protection against other blood borne diseases such as HIV.

Action to be taken in the event of a blood spill, in an accident where bleeding occurs and if:

1. Skin is penetrated or broken; the immediate first aid is to clean the wound with soap and water only. If water is not available a 70% alcohol hand rub should be used.
2. Clothes are bloodstained; they should be changed for clean clothes once the wound has been treated. They should be handled with rubber gloves and treated as above.
3. Blood gets on the skin, irrespective of whether there are cuts or abrasions, wash well with soap and water.
4. Eyes are contaminated; rinse the area gently but thoroughly, with eyes open, with water or normal saline.
5. A player is wearing contact lenses:
 - Leave the contact lenses in while the eye is irrigated with water or normal saline, as the contact lenses are acting as a barrier to the eye.
 - When the eye has been adequately irrigated for several minutes, remove the contact lenses and clean in the normal manner.
 - They can then be reused. They do not need any cleaning other than is normal.
6. Blood gets in the mouth; spit it out and rinse the mouth with water several times.
7. Where there is additional concern about infection, medical advice should be sought from a physician or clinic where there is experience in the management of HIV infection.

Guidelines - General

To be read with the sport specific match regulations.

All participating schools are expected to compete in a friendly good spirited way. Any problems are to be referred to the Sports Coordinator of both schools or if at a central venue – the Fields/Courts Coordinator of the venue and then also their Sports Coordinators. Further action to be forwarded in writing to the Administrative Officer of the Association.

Participants must know the rules of the game they are playing and abide by them. Players must have played 50% of the fixtures to be eligible to play in finals.

Participants must accept the referee's/umpire's decision with sportsmanlike behaviour. If in doubt, clarification may be requested through the game captain.

The conduct of participants must be in accordance with the spirit of fair play and the following principles:

- **Show a respectful and courteous attitude toward referees and opponents.**
- **Avoid actions and attitudes aimed to influence the decisions of the referees or to cover up faults committed by their team.**
- **Avoid actions and attitudes aimed at prolonging dead times or considered deliberate delays of the game.**

WASHOUT: Phone calls will be made to school Sports Coordinators **by 1.00pm.**

FORFEITS: The forfeiting school must contact the opposition no later than **12.30pm**

Central Venues - Central Venue Coordinators in consultation with the BSGSA Administrative Officer to make the final decision.

Home & Away - Individual schools to contact opponents on a match by match basis.
- BSGSA Administrative Officer to make the final decision.

It is encouraged if matches are to go ahead, they must be contested in a safe environment. They are played as “competition matches” unless: more than 50% of all matches are rained out/cancelled then all teams in that competition will receive draw points.

All students must be in the correct school/team uniform.

RESULTS:

All schools/teams to send match results at end of each round to their Sports Coordinator who will then provide results to the Administrative officer of the Association.

NB Results not received by the Administrative officer of the Association (by either of the teams involved) by 12.00pm on the Friday following a fixture will result in no points being awarded to both sides.

If at the end of these five rounds of kicks the teams have scored an equal number of goals, sudden death rounds of one kick each are used until one side scores and the other does not.

	<p>Only players who were on the pitch at the end of play are allowed to take kicks.
