## **Sportswoman of the Year – World Paddle Awards**



Lisa Carrington (NZL) was crowned 2015 Sportswoman of the Year at the World Paddle Awards, held in Barcelona, Spain in March 2016.

In 2015 Lisa had an outstanding year, winning two world titles – in WK1 500m and WK1 200m, as well as four World Cup gold medals! In addition, she is a wonderful role model for all young people engaged in sport. Congratulations Lisa!

As a gold medallist in WK1 200m at the 2012 London Olympic Games, Lisa will be aiming to win in both individual women's kayak events (200m & 500m) at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games. We wish her every success!

## 2015 Pacific Games Showcased Women's Participation

An analysis of participation at the 2015 Pacific Games showed that women athletes from eleven teams won more that 42% of the medals for their respective countries. Fiji was the standout with 55% of medals won by women.

When considering the 28 sports on the Pacific Games program, some 18 (64%) achieved equality of events (50%) for women, and three (3 - 10%) - were in the 40% range of events for women.



Barbara Vali-Skelton (PNG), pictured left, is receiving WASO travel support to compete at the Oceania Championships where she hopes to qualify on merit for the Rio Olympic Games. If successful, Barbara will be the only female swimmer on the 2016 PNG Swim Team. Good luck Barbara!

**Oceania Women in Leadership** - The IOC set 20% as a target for all NOC's, and sports federations to achieve by 2005 for representation by women on their decision-making boards.

Ten years on, this updated database (left) shows two NOC's below the 20% target, and 5 below 30%. Any changes to these figures should be notified to the WASO Chair, as they occur.

**Rio Chef de Missions**: Four (4) NOC Teams will be lead by women at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games – Australia (Kitty Chiller), Fiji (Cathy Wong), Palau (Baklai Temengil) and PNG (Emma Waiwai)

A National Women's Beach Volleyball League was initiated in the Marshall islands (photo below) in 2015 and a veteran women's league is planned for the future.



The Women's Sport Festivals Initiative launched late in 2015 was taken up by eleven island nations with a

variety of activities. All events were well supported. Some highlights include:

- ASA used the International Day of the Girl to conduct a sport expo and a 5 km walk/run, supported by the Governor.
- FSM organised training in 3 sports for each of 10 participating schools, followed by one day of competition.
- Fiji used a Volleyball tournament and fun games to reinforce the message of preventing Violence against Women.
  Samoa ran a Women's Sports Challenge, launched on International Women's Day, where participants engaged in five sports over one month, culminating with a Seminar and Gala Awards Evening. Tag Line; "Because We Can!"
- Solomon Is brought together athletes and administrators from eleven (11) sports to "kick start" their W&S activities.
