



NETBALL OPERATIONS

When looking back over the past four years we have said "What an exciting year it has been for us here at the Centre". This year is no different except it now reads "What an exceptional year it has been with outstanding results being secured both on and off the court". We have continued building and creating successes in all facets of the business and the game of netball, and now have a structure and brand that does the Centre and its members proud.

The year started off with Netball Wellington Centre hosting the New Zealand Champs at ASB Sports Centre with 18 teams in attendance. A big increase in numbers on previous years which brought about some entertaining netball and moments for team management, players, umpires, bench officials, volunteers and spectators. The Centre had not won this tournament since 1996 so when it was realised our team had made it through to the final on 2nd October 2015 the intensity and atmosphere at ASB Sport Centre was euphoric. Our community rallied around this team, extra seating was installed, and the scene was set for the team to make some Netball Wellington Centre history. This is indeed what they did by winning the following:

- 2015 Netball New Zealand National Championship last held 19 years ago
- 2015 Netball New Zealand National Championship Defence Violet Gilmour Trophy
- 2015 Netball New Zealand National Championship Goal Average Lady June Blundell Cup
- Five players named in the tournament team
- AND recipient of the Sport Wellington 2015 Team of the Year Award



This start provided a good foundation for the remainder of our age group representative teams. We had the following successes - 1st for Under 19, 1st for Under 17 Black, 3rd for Under 17 Gold, 4th for Under 15 Black and 6th for Under 15 Gold and a good number of our players named in the tournament teams. In addition to this our three Junior Netball Satellites – Motu Kairangi, Wellington West and Northern Suburbs Netball all secured commendable results with their Year 7&8 teams which provides us with the depth we need to continue on this road of success. We thank all the coaches, managers, officials, players and whanau for their dedication and support towards their various campaigns.

We are also celebrating the success in the high performance area for the Centre. We have had a good number of our players named in the tournament teams at the national and lead-up tournaments, plus umpires and bench officials allocated to finals. We have had players named in the NZ U21 Squad, NZ Secondary School trials and team, Netball Central Beko team and Central





Pulse team. We have also had players inducted onto the Pathway to Pulse and Pathway to Podium programmes, coaches achieving the Netball New Zealand Performance Coach Award and accepted onto Sport Wellington's Performance Coach Advance programme, and umpires named in Netball NZ Squads. To see the various pathways so visual this year for players, coaches and umpires is something that the Centre has been working towards and to now see these in fruition is a proud moment for us all.

Once again our secondary school teams and players did us proud in October 2015 with Wellington East Girls' College (coach James Laursen) finishing 3rd place, St Mary's College (coach Pelesa Semu) 4th Place, Wellington Girls' College (coach Emma Weenink) 5th Place. We had 7 Wellington based girls named in the Tournament Team of 12. Along with this three umpires attended this tournament in Ashburton – Gemma Kennedy, Melissa Howard and Jamie Manuel.

We have had another sterling year with our umpires as Ann Hay was named Netball Wellington Centre's Umpire of the Year due to the many successes she achieved over the year. Joining Ann and Paul as an NZA umpire this year was Jess Lea after a lot of hard work, dedication and commitment. We also celebrated another 100% theory pass this year so credit to the umpires and their tutors for their commitment to the six weeks of theory classes. This year also saw the reintroduction of our junior umpires and mentoring programme which has increased our umpire numbers at the Elementary level by 26 with the hope of more adults and junior umpires coming on board in 2017.

We have continued on with the ANZ futureFERNS Year 1&2 and Year 3&4 programme in our Motu Kairangi and Northern Suburbs Netball, and Wellington West Satellites. This year 1167 young girls and boys attended this programme, along with a good number of parents and whanau as Star Helpers, Coaches and Junior Coordinators. This was an increase of 500 players compared to 2015 showing good growth in playing numbers for this age group. It is a joy to see these young players and budding coaches learning and enjoying the game of netball. Big thanks to Maria from our office, Irene van Dyk – Netball Central Zone, Shelley Banks - Motu Kairangi Netball, Shannon Maddern-Daniels & Yvonne Hill - Northern Suburbs Netball, and Maria Nunns – Wellington West Netball, for being instrumental in delivering the positive message around these programmes and setting in place the beginner pathway for our players of the future.

We want to thank the Board, Life Members, Service Award Holders, Coaches, Managers, Officials, School Sports Coordinators, Club Committees and the many volunteers who have assisted throughout the season in some way towards the game of netball here at the Centre. We know that the work entailed to run the club and school teams is enormous and you all give your time generously to ensure that players have a team and are dressed in uniform ready to take the court. A tremendous amount of work by a small few at times and we thank you for this work helping to keep the game of netball a sport of choice for many.

I would like to sincerely thank my team of dedicated and passionate workers. Maria, Peter, John and Jo have continued on with the same passion and commitment year in and year out. They are open to new initiatives and are supportive to changes that are identified as growth areas for the Centre. We also have a number of casual workers that assisted in the running of the programmes and competitions successfully over 2016. Thank you in particular to our long standing casual staff members - Ray Hogan, Bubs Reweti, Amelia Wheeler and Geoff Howard for their steadfast support to the Centre.

Hataitai Park

ASB Sports Centre houses our premier, senior Club and college game play, development for the Centre, with long term plans to maintain this arrangement. Hataitai continues to be used and is the home of our winter competition minor collegiate grades and the inter-satellite intermediate competition, coach development, umpire development, centre and club meetings, representative team trainings, regional tournaments, storage, Spring and Summer Twilight, additional office space for the staff, and show casing the history of Netball Wellington Centre.



The Hataitai Pavilion café was once again supported by Mike and the team from Pita Pit Newtown and was very well received by Saturday competition patrons. They provided a great selection of healthy food and drink options with demand exceeding supplies in many instances. The provision of indoor café facilities remains an important way to provide essential services and adds a welcoming atmosphere for our Saturday Competition attendees.

The Hataitai Pavilion remains available for hire by both our members and the outside public. With a variety of spaces available including the large upstairs area, an upstairs board style room, and small meeting room and a downstairs room on offer, it has the potential to remain well utilised as it has been hired out for sporting events, prize-giving's, private functions, seminars & workshops, indoor trainings and meetings in the past.

Throughout the year we have carried out repairs to roof, toilet areas, and the board room at the Hataitai building, with plans for the installation of heat pumps and new lights in the main area in October 2016. We are continuing discussions with WCC, Sport Wellington and other park users around the long term plans for Hataitai Park and the possibility of a Sportsville Hub being established to cater for all our members. We believe that netball has a long term place at Hataitai Park so we will remain actively involved in discussions in regards to our Hataitai building and how we can best use our asset.

ASB Sports Centre

We remain one of the highest users of the ASB Sport Centre fully utilising all 12 courts as part of our Saturday winter competition during 2016, for three nights a week for our twilight competitions, two nights a week for Kids' Comp, Teen League and development programmes, our school holiday programmes in all four terms, and school coaching programmes during the term for year 1-8. We continually look for other opportunities that we can offer at the ASB Sports Centre during the day to the community so that we can include all age groups,



gender and abilities. This year was no exception with us coaching Korfball which particularly seemed to appeal to our young male players.





FUNDING/SPONSORSHIP/SUPPORTERS

The funding from Gaming and Charitable Trusts is invaluable to support the overall operation of the Centre, securing staff 12 months of the year, providing a wide range of competitions to meet the diverse range of patrons in the game of netball, development programmes and academies to cater for all ages and abilities, providing a pathway for players, umpires, officials and coaches by running representative programmes for Under 15, 17, 19 and 19+ age groups, and emerging talent programmes.

During 2016, gaming and racing board trust funding was granted by New Zealand Community Trust (NZCT), Infinity Foundation Limited, Four Winds Foundation Limited, Pub Charity, Pelorus Trust, The Lion Foundation, New Zealand Racing Board, and Wellington Community Trust. We thank these funders greatly for their ongoing support to the Centre and our members. Without these funders the cost to play the game of netball would be beyond the reach of many and we would not be able to sustain our current status as the 3rd biggest netball centre in New Zealand both financially or in playing numbers.



The New Zealand Community Trust (NZCT) and Infinity Foundation Limited provide a large portion of the funding outside of the membership fees. These funds were put towards the salaries of staff



for the Centre, court hire and Netball Central Zone affiliation fees. The additional funders contributed towards the costs of representative team travel and accommodation, development, operational cost and first aid services.



We are fortunate that all our previous partners renewed their sponsorship in 2016, contributing to the Centre's operational success. We would like to thank them all for their support, and the trust they put in us to deliver back to them. We look forward to continuing to grow and foster our relationship in 2017.

COMPETITION

The Centre had some interesting movement at the start of the winter competition created by some member teams becoming small clubs with the addition of extra teams, other clubs also increasing their team numbers and unfortunately some clubs reducing their numbers or not putting teams in at all. As was the case in 2015 all of that as well as some significant player movement between clubs in particular amongst the top teams, led to some unpredicted results during the first round.

It was encouraging to see an increase of one club team registered in 2016, not quite the high of 98 teams registered in 2014, but a step in the right direction. In a similar vein, the college team registrations also increased by one team to 150 for the season. The overall competition continues to provide a high calibre of quality, with tightly contested games throughout the season and at the finals.

With the season stretching into September for the second season in a row and the new Beko National League creating some interesting player availability issues to resolve, a review of the overall season length and rules of the competition to clarify and strengthen some areas has been undertaken at the end of the season hopefully providing even more value to an already highquality competition. There is a lot of positivity surrounding the competition and we have an excellent facility at Hataitai and a truly first-class facility in the ASB Sports Centre. With room for expanding the competition should team numbers increase, there are a lot of good elements surrounding our winter competition which all bodes well for the future.

Overall another positive season, and we look forward to providing an even better competition for 2017.

COMPETITION FINAL PLACINGS

Premier 1

2016 saw a continuation of the format that allowed our Premier 1 teams to stay in our competition for the entire season. Prior to 2015 there was only one round before the top six teams transferred across to the Regional Super League. This season however has brought a new dynamic as the Beko National League is played on Sundays which required some Premier 1 teams to become innovative with their player selections and game management. We again saw some high quality games played all season long, and the top teams alternating wins against each other across the season creating an interesting Semi-Final week. The season culminated in a repeat of the 2015 Premier 1 Grand Final between PIC 1 and SMOG 1, with PIC 1 winning the game 53-42. Other results on Finals Day saw Wgtn East 1 defeat PIC 2 73-42 in the $3^{rd}/4^{th}$ Playoff, SMOG 2 won the $5^{th}/6^{th}$ Playoff against club mates SMOG 3 in a closely fought game 52-48 and in the $7^{th}/8^{th}$ Playoff St Mary's College 1 defeated Victoria University 1 by 54-33.

Regional Super League

2016 saw a return to the standard seven-week format for RSL, however there was a venue change with all games being played in the brand new Walter Nash Stadium in Lower Hutt, rather than moving around the centre venues across Wellington. With the NWC Premier 1 teams again staying in our competition all season, the team entries from RSL weren't automatically based on rankings which meant some clubs combined their top teams for the RSL competition and ultimately only three teams entered from our Centre - PIC, SMOG & Victoria University.



Despite those factors, Netball Wellington Centre continued their strong standing in RSL by taking two of the top three spots in the Division 1 competition. The PIC team had another great season finishing with a win over Upper Hutt Maidstone (from Hutt Valley) in the final (81-55), and in the 3rd/4th playoff SMOG played Naenae White (from Hutt Valley)with SMOG winning the closely contested game 53-52. The 3rd team centre-affiliated team was Victoria University playing for the first time in the RSL and finished 3rd in Division 2 beating Naenae Blue (from Hutt Valley) 60-54.

Premier 2 & 3, Premier Reserve & Senior competition

The rest of the grades from Premier 2 to Senior 7 all went well over the season and very few issues eventuated to provide a mostly positive season for all participants.

There was an interesting start to the season with some small clubs increasing their team numbers along with some significant player movement between clubs, meaning some unexpected results during the first round. Interestingly there was again an increase in the





number of players returning after several years off from the game. Overall there was an increase of two teams registered compared to the number of teams registered in 2015.

The 2016 season ran from 9th April (Senior Grading Day) through to the 10th September (Finals Day), taking into account holidays and a split round in July. The season for the Premier and Premier Reserve Grades lasts for 19 games over 23 weeks with no games played over ANZAC Weekend, Queens Birthday Weekend or the split round in July. The competition is made up of four rounds, Grading (7 weeks), Challenge (3 Weeks), Championship (7 Weeks) & Finals (2 Weeks). The senior grades follow the same format but have extra games beginning with the Senior Grading Day where three games (a reduction on the four games played in previous seasons) were played on the day to determine the each team's starting grade.

Regional Secondary School League (RSSL)








NETBALL DEVELOPMENT

Netball Wellington Centre strives to continue efforts to provide netball opportunities for our community whilst taking care to appeal to a variety of ages, skill levels and interests. Netball has become a year-round sport which is reinforced by the demand for netball to be accessible in the pre-season, mid-season and off-season and we do our best to cater. In addition to our own programmes the Centre continued to provide ongoing support to our three Junior Netball Satellites as they rolled out Netball New Zealand's ANZ futureFERNS programme for Year 1-3. We shall remain closely involved in 2017 as the initiative is further extended to encompass Year 4 and we embrace the launch of six-a-side netball for junior netballers in Year 5.

Our netball calendar incorporates an Off-Season Netball Development Programme in term four with a forward-focus especially for players looking ahead to the coming season. For those that just want to play for the love of the game we continue to offer social games at our PAK'nSAVE Kilbirnie Kids' Netball Comp or Teen League. To start off the new year we offer a Pre-Season Netball Development Programme held in term one as well as Mama Brown Get Ready For

Netball in acknowledgement that some of our younger members also seek a head-start. The main pre-season focus is to refresh skills in preparation for school and representative trials. During terms two and three the focus returns to maintaining and finetuning skills as we run our PAK'nSAVE Kilbirnie Junior Netball Academy building on basic skills. Our invite-only Senior Netball Academy held in term two and three guides players on what and how to improve after narrowly missing rep selection. It hones in on a solid grasp of basic fundamental movements, performing them consistently well and how to apply these successfully on court.



Together NWC Development Staff John Neho and Maria Hegarty delivered over 80 hours of school coaching and managed to keep even the most sceptical attendees engaged to the point where they enjoyed their netball experience. From introducing netball to visitors from America to enticing previously inactive youngsters to give sport a go to appeasing the most hard-core netballers while their fellow non-netball class mates flounder - all challenges are accepted and approached with enthusiasm.

Thanks must be given to the "pitch in" culture nurtured by General Manager Sue Geale - should the odd clash arise, it's all hands on deck. Thanks also to fellow colleagues Peter McDonald and Bubs Reweti who are happy to lend a helping hand when duty calls. This approach enables our Centre to spread ourselves ever-further to meet the requests made of us and consistently deliver a quality level of development opportunities. We are also grateful to have helpful volunteer associates who lend their skill in developing and supporting young players when called upon. Such willing helping hands really make a huge difference.

The Centre enjoyed making the most of further opportunities to foster good working relationships with our counterparts such as the Wellington City Council, Sport Wellington, Primary Sport Wellington and College Sport Wellington. Looking ahead to 2017 we aim to grow engagement within our netball community and provide further development opportunities in response to the growing needs of our patrons including beginner and experienced players, coaches, umpires and managers of all ages.

SCHOOL & TERTIARY DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Netball Wellington Centre continued to work in partnership with the Wellington City Council to deliver a quality sports coaching experience for schools in-house at the ASB Sports Centre. Interest in netball has eased resulting in fewer coaching hours and attendees this year. In light of this, an approach was made to the Council to discuss the possibility of assisting with coaching Korfball – a sport which shares a similar skill-set and rule-base to netball. While the overall number of school bookings declined from 23 last period to 15 this period we have broadened our development staff's coach expertise, sparked interest amongst boys thanks to the mixed-gender nature of Korfball and maintained contact with numerous schools in a different capacity.

We thank the ASB Sports Centre staff Yarride Rosario and Katie Fowler for working closely with us to enable the opportunity to highlight our sport. We embrace this mutually beneficial opportunity to increase community exposure to the amazing services on offer at ASB Sports Centre as we support growth and development through fun active sport participation.

The combined efforts of all NWC Staff, including Bubs Reweti, has made it possible to fulfil additional in-school development requests this year. We hope to forge closer relationships at primary, intermediate and secondary school level within our local community in the coming year.

NETBALL AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMMES

Off-Season and Pre-Season Netball Development Programme

The Off-Season Development Programme is offered in term four held at the ASB Sports Centre from October to December. The intention is to equip players with ideas to maintain their skills over the holiday period so the return to netball is not so daunting. The programme ran after school for 6 weeks catering to three age groups – future Year 7&8 on Mondays and Year 9 & Year 10 on Tuesdays. We again chose to group participants in anticipation of the age group they

enter for the 2016 netball season. By doing so we hoped to give Year 6 players helpful insight into the calibre of players they may be trialling against at Year 7 Satellite Rep trials and the work-rate and application expected from them as they step up an age bracket. Similarly the older age groups have the chance to adjust their mind-set and gain a mental and physical edge.

The Pre-Season Development Programme is offered in term one held at the ASB Sports Centre from February to March. The programme starts soon after the beginning of the school and aims



to lead-up to school and representative trials allowing motivated players to refresh basic footwork, ball and movement skills and hopefully making their mark at trials. Given that some Year 11 players are still eligible to trial for the U15 age group it was decided to retain three age groups however extend the Year 10 to include Year 11 as well. The change was well-received and even attracted attendance by U17 age level players wishing to get a head-start for trials. Coaches took care to indicate individual's improvement and provided personalised feedback throughout.

A decline in participant numbers in the past year is noted assumedly due to the presence of additional pre-season training independently run by clubs who have taken a proactive approach. One such club is PIC Netball Club who maximise the opportunity by opening up sessions for coaches to come and learn and we applaud their endeavours to grow fit netball-savvy young players for the betterment of all.

We owe much thanks to Bubs Reweti, working alongside John Neho, for generously contributing her sound knowledge base in an effort to developing youngsters to play to the best of their abilities by improving any weaknesses and maximising strengths.

Get Ready For Netball

Mama Brown Get Ready for Netball was again offered as a pre-season six-week after-school programme held for one hour at the ASB Sports Centre on Mondays in term one. The programme benefits Year 5&6 players hoping to get a head start on refreshing basic netball skills ahead of school trials and also boosts confidence with ball-handling. Development staff Maria Hegarty and John Neho led the sessions taking care to disguise skills amongst fun activities and modified games where possible to allow attendees to put newfound skills into action. While the uptake is not overwhelming we still receive requests for skill work with this age group prior to the season. We shall again offer the programme in 2017 alongside a concerted promotion effort. Thank you to our attendees and parents and our sponsor Mama Brown your ongoing support shown towards this junior development initiative.

Junior Netball Academy

The PAK'nSAVE Kilbirnie Junior Netball Academy remains a constant in the netball calendar on offer on Wednesdays during term two and three as a six-week after-school programme held at the ASB Sports Centre. The Academy hosts two age groups - Year 5&6 and Year 7&8 and focuses on developing player's confidence and understanding performing basic fundamental skills such as movement, footwork, ball skills, attack, defence and shooting. Some participants opt to





attend as an added skill-boost should they not have weekly team trainings. Others seek new techniques to apply during their Saturday game while others just want to have fun with friends. Netball Development Coordinator John Neho took up coaching duties with grateful input from Bubs Reweti. Attendance appears to fluctuate from year to year and while we promote directly via mail-out to schools and previous participants we must acknowledge that we are in a competitive market competing against a myriad of sports on offer these days. We remain happy to work with any attendees who wish to gain an added extra. Many thanks to our sponsor PAK'nSAVE Kilbirnie for your ongoing support for this programme. We also wish to thank the supportive parents who continue to seek out these junior initiatives along with our participants who relish the opportunity to have a run around with their coach.



Senior Netball Academy

Since its inception in 2012, the Senior Netball Academy has met the needs of the U15 age bracket run as a six-week programme held Tuesdays in term two and three at the ASB Sports Centre. Bubs Reweti leads the sessions with assistance from John Neho tailoring towards players who narrowly miss selection. Work-on areas are identified from feedback noted during trials and attendees are guided through how to improve upon them. Trialists who fell short in the final



stages of trials are individually invited with the intention of turning possible disappointment into determination given knockbacks at this age can lead to loss of interest and increased dropout rates. By tracking players who show commitment and desire to improve, we hope to channel their motivation into expanding their skillset and provide a sound platform for successful selection the following year. Our gratitude goes to Bubs for her

boundless passion, patience and time invested in instilling self-believe and resilience in young players.

ANZ futureFERNS

Netball New Zealand's ANZ futureFERNS programme has been adopted nationally and received a favourable response amongst participants, parents and coaches alike as they see their youngsters engaged, actively exploring netball and having a ball while at it. New resources have also been launched complete with a range of bright-coloured equipment, specialised bibs, printed resources, online videos and workshop content. After being one of the first Centres to take part in the pilot in 2013 we are proud to report all three Junior Satellites now run their own ANZ futureFERNS programme in their own suburbs and boast great numbers of players and supporters in attendance. We shall continue to work alongside each Satellite to support them by facilitating future training workshops and information sessions designed to ease nerves as parents are gently coaxed into taking up support roles. We are delighted with the progress





made and look forward to supporting our Satellites further as they extend to fully embrace Year 4 in 2017 and further navigate the roll-out of Netball New Zealand's new six-a-side initiative for Year 5&6 on the horizon.

Thank you for the Netball Central Zone staff for their ongoing support implementing the ANZ futureFERNS initiative – especially Junior Development Officer Irene van Dyk and Community Netball Manager Stuart Savage for guidance offered throughout the year. It has been a pleasure getting to know our Satellite liaisons putting in many hours in your own areas - Shelley Banks from Motu Kairangi, Shannon Maddern-Daniels and Yvonne Hill from Northern Suburbs and Maria Nunns from Wellington West. A big thank you also to the enthusiastic parents, teachers and wee netball stars thoroughly enjoying themselves and helping to spread the word.

Fitness Initiatives

Fitness February was a successful initiative in 2015 but unfortunately we were unable to reoffer in 2016 due to a change in availability for our facilitator of choice. The Centre plans to revive this

initiative in 2017. In August we were fortunate to be approached to host NETFIT sessions led by Laura Langman, Sarah Wall and guest instructor Katrina Grant. These onehour aerobic-style netball-specific movement sessions set to high tempo music proved extremely popular drawing interest from Year 5 to adult participants. A lot of fun was had by all. Following its success we hope to reoffer these sessions in



2017 as a valuable way to bring fun back to fitness and conditioning in a group environment.

The use of representative players has been well received by attendees and is a handy illustration to young impressionable minds of where hard work and determination can take you when you apply yourself. Every effort is made to maximise learning through the use of fun games, managing age groups, keeping friends together for increased enjoyment and gauging skill and level of interest so as to encourage first-time attendees to "give it a go" yet also challenge those who crave fresh netball encounters.

Holiday programme attendance appears to be consistent with last year most likely given the ever-increasing multitude of holiday activities on offer which makes for healthy competition. It is comforting to hear that Council-run holiday programmes held at the ASB Sports Centre have experienced the same decline compared to earlier years. We intend to add some variety to our future programmes including specific one-day skill clinics for Year 7-13 yet ultimately continue to do our best to provide a quality product that appeals to the needs of our netball-loving and netball-curious community.

Holiday Netball Skills Clinic

This year we decided to trial a September Holiday Netball Skills Clinic featuring a three hour session run in the morning for future Year 7&8 followed by a three hour session in the afternoon for future Year 9-11 in preparation for 2017. The clinic was run by Bubs Reweti and John Neho and attracted 19 participants in the younger age group and 17 in the older age group. This provides a good indication that some players desire the opportunity to give up their holiday time towards putting effort into upskilling and is pleasing to see. We intend to run a similar clinic again in each holiday period next year to further test the level of interest and uptake.

JUNIOR NETBALL SATELLITES

Netball Wellington Centre has three affiliated Satellites. Wellington West Netball, Northern Suburbs Netball and Motu Kairangi Junior Netball Satellites are stand alone clubs/entities and the Centres supports them with opportunities with Kiwi Whistler and adult umpiring programmes, coaching programmes, Intermediate Inter-Satellite Year 7 & 8 competition, ANZ futureFERNS for Year 1&2 and Year 3&4, player development opportunities from Year 1 through to Year 8, and operational support.

The 2016 Intermediate Inter-Satellite Competition finals were played on Saturday 3rd September at the Hataitai Courts with some exciting talent on display. Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Nga Mokopuna Moko Toa secured first place in the competition after winning a tightly contested game against Karori Normal Totora 22-17.

Raroa Eagles secured 3rd place against Newlands Intermediate School Kuri with a final score of 44-11. EBIS Totara came in 5th place with a win over St Frances Rockets 33-18. QMC Red and Marsden K1 rounded out the competition. Well done to all players, coaches, managers, umpires & supporters who made the season another highly enjoyable one, and provide a strong foundation as these players really are the future for Netball Wellington Centre.







REPRESENTATIVE NETBALL

The 2016 season has featured numerous successes amongst the six teams representing Netball Wellington Centre. We again selected two representative teams in the U15 and U17 age group, one team in the U19 age group and introduced one team at Open Grade (19 +) level. It is always a joint effort to ensure all six campaigns run smoothly for the duration with various input covering all facets from logistics to fundraising and all-important human resources committed to investing their expertise for the season.

The U15 and U17 team trials were held in April at Hataitai Netball Courts. Trials for the shorter U19 campaign were held in May and the Open Grade (19+) in September at the ASB Sport Centre. The U15 trial dates were held over 4 days including separate Year 9 and Year 10&11 dates and the other age groups over 3 days. Trial dates were promoted directly to all previous trialists courtesy of mailing lists collated from past trial attendees and via the Netball Wellington Centre website and Facebook. Sport Coordinators and Club Captains were emailed and encouraged to prompt Senior/ Junior A and B players and Premier/Prem-Reserve level players to nominate. In addition Sport Coordinators were updated with a list of registered trialists in an effort to afford the chance to follow-up glaring player omissions by coaxing those they felt would benefit from trialling. This season Hutt Valley Netball Centre opted to select their own U19 age group team therefore our trials were open to eligible players from the four remaining Wellington Regional Centres.

U15 trial attendance dropped slightly with 82 trialists in 2015 and 72 in 2016. The format for the U15 trials differed from previous years in an effort to contend with the high volume of trialists and allow greater opportunity to fairly observe all. A total of 28 Year 9 trialists attended the first trial date. The Year 10&11 trialists attended their own trial date. Those called back from each age group attended the third trial date along with any who could not make their first trial date. The fourth trial date was reserved for final decision-making. U15 trials continue to attract a strong level of talent supporting the selection of two teams made up of 24 players. The U17 trials managed to attract 43 trialists this year, making it feasible to select two very strong teams to attend Nationals in Rangiora. This decision proved to be a good one as our U17 Black team won the National Tournament while the Gold team placed 3rd with only one loss throughout the week long tournament.



2015 brought about concerns around our U19 trialist numbers but 2016 was more encouraging with a good number of trialists of a high calibre. Due to this high calibre the group remained as a





squad which brought about some strong healthy competition from within and also assisted with some of the difficult decisions that needed to be made around final selections.

The success of the Netball Wellington Centre representative programme was made possible by funding towards travel, accommodation; training venue hire and uniform costs generously provided by The Lion Foundation, Infinity Foundation Limited, Pub Charity and the New Zealand Racing Board for which we are hugely grateful.

The U15 Black team had a total new management team this year but were fortunate to benefit from the return of Sue Bentley who has held previously lead coach roles with NWC over the years. Sue was joined by Wendy Osborne appointed as Assistant Coach and Sue



Critchlow as her Manager. A strong U15 Black team made up of a mix of new and familiar faces was selected from a stand-out pool of talent. The team achieved fantastic results finishing 1st in all lead-up tournaments attended in 2016. Unfortunately we didn't retain the U15 North Island Championship instead finishing 4th in A Grade. The U15 Gold management team had a total new look this year with Tash Tawhara appointed as Lead Coach and Marchelle Dann as Assistant Coach. We also welcomed Chelsea Mackinder who joined our Centre for the first time to take up Team Manager duties. The U15 Gold team retained a focus on player development and managing equal playing time which paid off as the team formed a tight bond that spoke volumes on court keeping their loss margin to a minimum exhibiting

immense improvement throughout the season.

This year we had a very high standard of coaches appointed for both of the U17 teams. Pelesa Semu was appointed Lead Coach for the U17 Black team with Frances Solia as her Assistant Coach and experienced club level manager Linda Robinson took up manager duties for all tournaments prior to Nationals. We also welcomed Natasha Jacobs who joined our Centre for the first time to take up Team Manager duties for the U17 Age Group National Championships . With an impressive level of trialists to select from, the U17 Black team made the most of a wide array of talent and camaraderie to finish first place in all tournaments attended and come back as U17 National Champions. We welcomed back a highly experienced coaching team for the U17 Gold Team - Anna Andrews-Tasola as Lead Coach and Bub's Reweti appointed Assistant Coach they had seasonal managers for this campaign as well two very experienced managers who have managed with previous NWC teams over the years. Lissa Collier as manager for all tournaments prior to Nationals and Margaret Perry for National's only. This team finish exceptionally well this year it has been a while since Netball Wellington Centre has sent two U17's to Nationals but well worth the effort as the U17's Gold Team finish 3rd out of 40 teams that attended this year's tournament.







We were privileged to attract Sandra Edge back to our Centre as Lead Coach of the U19 team after her previous success with this age group last year finishing 4^{th} out of 20 teams . In support

of her efforts to apply her extensive knowledge to this older age group, she was joined by Lindsay Filiata as her Assistant Coach who return to coaching at Netball Wellington Centre after coaching at Netball Kapiti for a couple of years. Donna Campbell completed the management team making good use of her secondary school level experience as Team Manager. The Team Management did their utmost best to create a close team bond with strong player combinations while juggling intermittent attendance from Beko National League team members. It was a very trying time for Sandra and her management team as a number of players were part of the Central Beko National League team and often had



training on the same day as the team making it hard to make the most of a full team turn-out at trainings and lead-up tournaments. To their credit, the players gelled extremely well at Nationals. The team progressed to the finals unbeaten where all 12 players took the court and can now claim the title of reigning U19 Age Group National Champions. The team shone through producing outstanding wins and played with a lot of heart throughout their campaign.

October 2015 marked the end of an era with the last NZ Champs tournament held in Wellington. This created a gap in the player pathway for the pool of 19+ age group players who had not secured a position on the NCZ Beko National League or Central Pulse team rosters. In an effort to bridge this gap Netball Wellington Centre initiated a tournament for this age group with the support of four centres from Netball Central Zone. All four centres attended an inaugural tournament held at Arena Manawatu in October 2016. This initiative was a great success enabling it to become a permanent fixture in the tournament calendar with the hope that more teams will participate in 2017.

To lead our new Open Grade (19+) team we appointed a very experienced and knowledgeable coaching team consisting of Julie Wilson as Lead coach and Erica Campbell as Assistant Coach. It has been a few years since the last time these two have been part of the Netball Wellington Centre family so it was great to welcome them back to the fold. We also welcomed Darrell Doig to our Centre for the first time to take up Team Manager duties for the team. The team placed 3^{rd} out of four teams - a great experience and leaning curves for player and the management team.

COACH DEVELOPMENT

Netball Wellington Centre continues to hold the role of Lead Centre for Coach Development in the Wellington region. As initiated last year, Netball Central Zone continued their valued work organising coach development and delivery of Netball New Zealand accredited coaching modules throughout our Zone. The Zone maintain responsibility for plotting course dates in liaison with netball centres, arranging coach developers to facilitate courses and administration duties such as compiling registrations, payments and providing course resources. We are fortunate to reap the benefits of continued support from Sandra Edge in her Coach Development Officer role at Netball Central Zone combined with her passion and enthusiasm for providing learning opportunities and support for keen coaches at all levels. Sandra's commitment to maximising any development opportunity to benefit as many as possible in attendance is just one of her many talents we appreciate and we extend hearty thanks for all her time, care and devotion kindly contributed throughout the year.

Our coach development sights have broadened and now include upskilling our coach developers – put simply "training the trainer". Both of our development staff attended a compulsory Netball New Zealand (NNZ) Community Development Forum held in Auckland in February embracing the chance to extend their presentation skills and learn from fellow development staff in attendance from around the country. The forum built on ideas introduced in 2015 and touched on the introduction of new rules, new ANZ futureFERNS resources for Year 5-8 and the launch of the ACC NetballSmart warm-up.



With grateful support from Netball Central Zone, Netball Development Officer Maria Hegarty also attended a newly launched Sport Wellington Coach Developer Training initiative. The programme was made up of six sessions spaced over six months including practical and observation activities and also enabled information-sharing amongst regional development officers from a range of other sporting codes around the Wellington region. Maria put her newly acquired skills to good use facilitating a total of 37 hours of ANZ futureFERNS workshops attended by 204 coaches. It is intended that the Centre's Netball Development Coordinator John Neho will be part of the next intake in the coming year. This should then enable the Centre to provide facilitators who can confidently and competently lead workshops as well as conduct coach observations to provide on-the-spot constructive feedback.

We are lucky to already have an experienced group of independent coach developers based in the Wellington region however with succession planning in mind it is good to expand our resource pool. We extend big thanks to current Coach Developers Sandra Edge, Karen Bevan, Lindsay Filiata, Tash Rowlands and Irene van Dyk. Your ongoing time and willingness to travel in order to increase the knowledge-base of our community of coaches and empower them is very much appreciated.

While there have been fewer informal offerings than in previous years in 2017 we aim to cater for a growing desire to tap into the aural, kinaesthetic and visual

learning needs of our coach community.

In the period spanning October 2015 to September 2016 a total of 10 coaches from throughout the Wellington region have completed the necessary accreditation to receive the Netball New Zealand Community Coach Award while two coaches have been accepted onto the Netball New Zealand Performance Coach Award/Performance Coach Qualification (PCQ). Netball New Zealand has recently undertaken a review of the current Coach Pathway with changes to be introduced as of February 2017. This will see the old Community Coach Award split into two branches – one technical and one tactical and will require a more concerted effort to attend a broader range of modules to complete each step. We will be interested to gauge reaction from coaches in the coming season. With the added step before beginning Performance Coach Qualification we expect numbers entering this higher level to remain low in future given the need for more time necessary to complete pre-requisite modules. On the flipside we hope the changes may lead to a healthy pool of coaches keen to coach National League, Centre U17/U19 rep team or Premier level given this is also a requirement in order to enter the PCQ coaching level.

Statement of Accounting Policies:

Reporting Entity

The special purpose financial statements presented here are for the entity Netball Wellington Centre (Incorporated) (the Centre), an Incorporated Society reporting under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and its Constitution.

1. Statement of Compliance

Basis of preparation

The External Reporting Board removed authorities support from "old NZ GAAP" for all year ends with periods beginning on or after 1 April 2015. Having given consideration to its ongoing financial reporting requirements, the entity will report using a special purpose basis going forward in accordance with the policies set out below. There have been no changes in accounting policies as a result of the transition to a special purpose basis of reporting.

The accounting policies have been applied in respect to the preparation of these special purpose financial statement are set out below.

Measurement Basis

Historical cost basis is used by the Centre for the measurement and reporting of income **a**nd expenses and financial position.

1.(a) Accounts Receivable:

Accounts receivable are stated at estimated realisable value. An estimate is made for doubtful debts based on a review of all outstanding amounts at the reporting date. Bad debts are written off during the period in which they are identified.

1.(b) Income Tax:

No taxation is provided for in the financial statements as the Centre is exempt from income tax under section CW46 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

1.(c) Goods and Services Tax:

The statement of financial performance has been prepared so that all components are stated exclusive of GST. All items in the statement of financial position are stated net of GST, with the exception of receivables and payables which include GST invoiced.

1.(d) Revenue Recognition:

Grant income is matched against expenditure incurred for that grant during the financial year. Where not all of a grant is spent by the end of the financial year, these unexpended funds are carried forward on the balance sheet into the subsequent financial year and matched to expenditure incurred during that year.

All other revenue streams are recognised on an accruals basis.

1.(e) Operating Leases:

Operating lease payments, where the lessors effectively retain substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the lease items, are included in the determination of the operating surplus in equal instalments over the lease term.

1.(f) Fixed Assets and Depreciation:

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation of the assets has been calculated on either a straight line or a diminishing value basis. This is to write off fixed assets over their estimated economic life or lease life as follows:

1.(g) Changes in Accounting Policies:

There have been no significant changes in accounting policies. All policies applied have been on a basis consistent with those used in previous years.





