

As it comes to the end of my first year as Commodore, I would have to be perfectly honest and say it has been a challenging start to my term. There was, and still is, much to be done. However I'm happy to report that I feel things have turned and I believe we are now on an upward trajectory.

Getting the financial status of the Club back to a more stable and sustainable position was the main focus of the General Committee's work this last year, and remains so. Some difficult decisions have had to be made, but were necessary to move forward.

Unfortunately there was quite a bit of un-budgeted expenditure this last year; primarily on the cranes, the travel lift, and the marina. This was in part due to a lack of maintenance or poor maintenance over the last few years and now it has all come home to roost. It was money that we had to spend to keep our assets up to scratch, not to mention comply with notices from WorkSafe.

On a positive note, the Club is very happy to have obtained the services of Roger Eastham as our Operations Director. Roger brings a wealth of experience from his years in the marine industry in Hong Kong, particularly his many years at Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club.

Roger has now been with us since the end of February and has a good understanding of the issues the Club is facing, and is tackling the issues with professionalism that only comes with good knowledge of the marine industry, clubs and marinas.

Sailing

Once again another successful sailing season has passed. The Club Marine Range series is still the premier series to sail on Port Philip, especially in Division 2 with some keen competition happening. Royals had three boats in the top five on IRC.

Unfortunately the weather gods conspired against us for the Association Cup this year. Due to the conditions there was no sailing, so we will have to wait another year to try and regain the Cup for Royals. Similarly the end of season race to Queenscliff, the Phoenix Trophy, also fell prone to the weather. However, at short notice it was determined to run a race "around the sticks" and then travel up the river to Docklands for the night, thus ensuring it was still a destination weekend. This is potentially a form of racing/cruising that could be added to the program on a regular basis.

What is exciting is that GC has formally approved the formation, through Sailing Committee, of an organising committee to develop a bid, secure and run the 2020 International Cadet Worlds at Royals. This event is in the early stages of course but there will be much more to come in the next few years. A fundraising committee will also be established and fundraising events will be held over the coming years to ensure the event is successful and is selffunding. RYCV has great experience and depth of knowledge in running these events successfully, both on water on water and off water, so we look forward to another successful world-class regatta at the Club.

I'm sure everyone agrees that it is good to see the Festival of Sails event returning to it's traditional timeslot of the Australia Day weekend.

Yard

As mentioned earlier, the biggest issue in the yard this year has been the overhaul of the two hardstand cranes and the travel lift. This has come about as a result of the visit from WorkSafe. The eastern crane was the first to be removed and taken off site to be stripped down, tested, repaired and rebuilt. By the time this goes to print, it should be back and commissioned. Once that is complete the western crane will receive the same treatment.

We have had the manufacturer of the travel lift in from New Zealand to do a complete inspection and report on the condition of the lift, also in response to WorkSafe. Fortunately it is a positive report. WorkSafe have accepted our proposal to repair/service based on manufacturer's specifications in the report, which will save a considerable amount of money for the Club at this time.

The travelift is back in operation and along with the cranes will now have a programmed maintenance schedule to ensure they stay in good condition.

However we have to realise that we should be looking at purchasing a new lift within the next five years. A new lift with the advances in design and technology will give the yard increased productivity and flexibility to accommodate the newer design yachts whilst still being able to cater for the older and classic yachts.

Governance

Under the chairmanship of Noel Williams, we have introduced a new Sub-Committee, the Governance Sub-Committee to look at all aspects of Governance within the Club. This committee has looked at many aspects of Club governance including the Code of Conduct, New Club Rules and By-Laws, Vision and Mission, and has run workshops for sub-committees to ensure that all sub-committees understand how they fit into the overall governance process. It's all about improving the processes and communication lines between GC, Sub-Committees, Management and you the membership.

Noel has also overseen the process of updating the Club Rules and By-Laws such that they follow the model rules as set out in the legislation.

Marina

When I became Commodore I thought that I might be the lucky one to be in office to cut the ribbon on the new marina; that will not be the case. However whilst we would have liked to build the complete project, the finances dictate that we manage it in a staged manner, stage one being the extension north of J row. I'm hopeful that I may be able to cut the ribbon on that extension.

Finance options (you can see a recurring theme here) are still being considered; Richard Gates and his finance team are working to achieve a financial solution that will not impact negatively on the Club.

Be reassured though, the committee is not sitting idle all this time, we are working our way through

the various approvals required to build such a project. We have presented to the Hobson's Bay City Council at Parks Victoria's request, and that was very well received. To get a little bit technical, the Club sits under the Port of Melbourne Planning Scheme, not Hobson's Bay, however as it's a good community and neighbourly thing to do, we readily complied with Park's request.

House

A special project team headed by Rear-Commodore Doug Shields has been "testing the waters" with outside catering companies with regard to food and beverage operations. Despite the improvement in reducing the wages and costs bill for this operation of the Club, we simply can't continue to sustain these types of losses, hence the need to look at alternatives as we certainly can't sustain the ongoing losses from this part of our operation. This is still a work in progress.

In finishing I can't let the opportunity go by without thanking our band of volunteers for the great work they have done and do around the Club for the past year. We simply would have great difficulty delivering the services we do without help from volunteers. That goes from all the members who sit on various committees and sub-committees, to these who run the raffles that enable us to purchase new bar furniture, to assisting in sailing activities and a whole range of other help, thank you.

Firstly I would like to thank the wonderful membership for their support, coming into the club captain role after such a long tenure being held by Captain David Ellis was always going to be a difficult act to follow.

The sailing committee and I were certainly up against it with a major restructure taking place across the GC as well as within the operational part of the organisation. As they say there is nothing like getting thrown in the deep end to either sink or swim. Our first task was to get the Lipton Cup in some sort of shape, and with all the incumbents incommunicado this was a challenge. We managed to hobble together a team and get the ball rolling and deliver what we hoped was a well-received event. The weather certainly helped ensure everyone had a great time.



David LeRoy once again provided outstanding support for the Sail Melbourne event and represented our Club as always by providing the best level of race management on the bay. Once again we supported the FoS in Geelong, although the fleet sizes were less than in previous events due to the date change, next year sees this rectified with the Australia Day weekend once again playing host to the biggest regatta in the southern hemisphere.

Along with the usual race management for RYCV events. David has once again provided support in ensuring everything is operational and running whether for the Off The Beach team or the big boat racing. Without this level of involvement and support it would be all the more difficult in holding events and maintaining the fleet and equipment.

The Bluebird fleet continues to grow with a number of boats joining the fleet and club over the past season. The regattas held for this class are hotly contested with the Intergalactics' being the highlight for the season, anyone involved in the class is passionate about this little boat and the camaraderie it brings. No matter the boat it is great to see people on the water racing and enjoying the sport, it is after all our driving goal.

The keel boat fleet continues to do well both inshore and offshore with a number of boats competing solidly in the ORCV events as well as the Club Marine series. It was heartening to see numbers improve for the ORCV winter series as it was looking likely the event would not proceed.

The off the beach fleet while presently going through a rebuilding stage continues to see solid results, We had a team representing RYCV at the recent Cadet Worlds in the Netherlands. We also have Claire Olding and Louise Schofield now sailing in 49er's and continuing to pursue their sailing careers, and while this is done for the most part at other venues they are both still representing our club.

The sailing Committee through the great work done by Blake Anderson held a WASZP come and try day just prior to the end of the season. This was very well supported over the two days with some of the younger members having a great time as well as some not so young members learning to fly. The team at WASZP Australia were keen to run more events like this, we are working with them on holding a regatta and try days as part of this year's Lipton Cup. Please keep an eye on e-news for details as we get closer.

The Cruising fleet has had a small hiatus with Andy being away for work, we will shortly have a new face taking the lead in this important area of the club with Ian Riechal taking on the role, So please welcome Ian and introduce yourselves and if you bump into Andy thank him for all the great work and effort put in over many years.

We hope to see a solid cruising fleet attending this year's Magical Mystery Tour.

After the success of this year's blown out Phoenix Event, we would like to hold more events of this nature with a small race to a destination, or just a cruise to the destination. It was clear from the feedback and numbers that this is something people were keen to see more of and were happy to participate in.



The sailing committee are also looking at introducing a Friday evening race 30 to 40 minutes in total for the last 8 weeks of the twilight season.

This will be a very light hearted event with the goal being to get some of the less used club boats on the water as well as member boats. More detail will follow on this event in the near future. The aim is to have OTB as well as keel boats compete and then enjoy the members draw and a meal.

On the sail training front the club continued to provide training for a number of local schools including Williamstown High, Sandridge Primary, Laverton P12 and Altona P9, Yarraville primary and St Mary's as well as drawing other schools from outside of Hobsons Bay such as Overnewton College, Catholic Regional College and Suzanne Cory High . In the 2016/17 season we introduced to over 350 primary and secondary school students to the sport of sailing.

With adult training the Training Centre saw substantial increases in the number of people coming through both the Keelboat boat and Powerboat Licence courses with many of the keelboat participants joining the fleet as crew on member's boats. Overall the centre had over 950 participants attend training courses at the Club.

In closing due to some very time consuming work commitments I am unfortunately needing to step down from the role as Club Captain, I see no value for the membership in me continuing in the role as I just do not have the time available to support it to the level I feel the members need and I am able to commit too, once again my sincere thanks for all the support and well wishes and I will see you all around the club..

Yard and Marina Committee

We again have seen changes in yard operation. Last year I reported the completion of the concreting work and the inspection from Worksafe with its associated implications in terms of practices and overhauls.

In the past year we have welcomed Joel Taranto as our Waterfront Manager and Max Bandelli to the team.

Our financial performance has not met expectations, and your Yard and Marina Committee has taken action to remedy this. Tony Sneddon has reviewed our charging system, and we have developed a fee system that will assist the club to remedy the financial loss. We will be reducing the "free time" in the yard, and reducing some of the operational costs. This will encourage members to plan their hardstand work such that time out of the water is minimised.



The new rates have been approved by General Committee, and we are in the process of upgrading out marina software to accommodate the changes.

We are part way through the planned overhaul of our cranes.

The western hard stand crane is with our contractor, having a full strip down and refurbishment. This will be installed before the start of the summer season, and then the western hardstand crane will be removed and overhauled.

The travel lift has completed its full repair, however the mast crane has been found to be overloaded and will have to be removed and repaired. Our piled marina is showing its age, and we have had some structural failures in the recent gales. This has particularly been evident in J row. We have commenced a repair programme to reinforce some piles and replace others. We have also completed an inspection and replacement programme for the marina attachments, as some were showing signs of wear.

All of these issues are inevitable in a timber marina that is approaching its "end of economic life"

This leads me on to the new project of building the Stage 1 of our Floating marina.

Stage 1 will be built to the north of our current piled marina.

We plan to build about 44 floating pens, accommodating boats from 12 to 20 metres in length.

Although not finalised at this point in time, our current plan is to build

- 2 pens to accommodate 20m (or longer) boats
- 42 pens to accommodate 14m boats

These numbers may be revised in the final plan.

To build the floating marina need to protection from northerly gales and ship surge.

This will be achieved by constructing a full depth concrete wave wall, 116 metre long, on the northern boundary of our new lease, and a 75 metre partial depth wave wall on the north eastern boundary.

The western side of the marina will have a 4metre wide floating attenuator along its full length. There will be no permanent mooring on the western side of the floating attenuator.

The building of stage 1 of out floating marina will also have the benefit of providing much needed wave and surge protection to our piled marina.

Your Yard and Marina Committee has completed a number of locker inspections in the past few months and I thank members for removing the hazardous and flammable items that were discovered during our checks.

It is a safety requirement that no fuel or fuel containers be kept in lockers.

Yard and Marina


The reason that empty fuel containers are not acceptable is because they will contain fuel vapours that are more flammable than the liquid fuel.

The club has installed a purpose built fuel storage area where empty/full fuel containers can be stored to the east of the clubhouse.

Rod Alsop, ably assisted by Peter Dusting, has taken on the task of replacing whalers in the area of the eastern hard stand crane. This work is now complete and we thank them for their efforts.

John Rob replaced the decking on our floating ramps at the beginning of the year, making it safe for our OTB sailors.

Finally I would like to thank members of Yard and Marina Committee for their support through the year, namely Doug Hemm, Rod Alsop, Sandy Doull, Peter Midecke, Tony Sneddon, Joel Taranto, Roger Eastham and particularly John Burgess for keeping us in order as Secretary. Thanks also to Joel and Max for running our yard operation during a difficult period.

Marina Project Committee

For several years we have been proceeding with a plan to redevelop our entire current marina with a new floating facility comprising 200 plus berths. However, early this year, our General Committee decided that the re-development of our marina should be undertaken in stages. Accordingly, it was decided that Stage 1 will be built immediately north of J Row of the existing marina and comprise some forty-two berths. Following further investigation it is possible that we may construct up to fifty berths which will include several berths along the northern side of the existing J Row arm. Consideration of the number of berths and configuration will be finalised shortly.

The consequence of this approach is that the existing marina will remain intact for the time being and therefore the challenge is to not only retain full occupancy of the current marina but to ensure a take up of the additional new berths.

This revised approach has necessitated additional design works in respect of the initial stage, preliminary re-tendering by the four prospective contractors, review of permits and re-application for permits where required and a revised approach to the financing of the construction.

Discussions with Parks Victoria have continued to ensure compliance with our lease covenants and obligations to other authorities together with obtaining further guidance from our legal and accounting advisors, all of which is nearing completion.

The first works will involve the erection of the full and partial depth wave walls situated on the northern and eastern boundaries of our lease.. This will provide some protection to our existing marina and it is therefore anticipated that its life will be extended and ongoing maintenance costs reduced.

The staging of the process is a financially prudent approach to renewing our current marina which is obviously nearing its end of life. We anticipate presenting the proposal to members within the next two months.

House and Social Sub-Committee

CURRENT STATUS

The major social events were well supported and reflect satisfaction from Club members. Bar trade on sailing days and for the Friday night draw is also well supported. Unfortunately other trading periods have suffered from declining member support. It has been necessary to take action in relation to bar trading hours which now see the Bar closed on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. The Dining Room has also been closed for Friday night dining although it is proposed to test a summer period, monthly Friday night dinner with guest speaker. Other Dining Room service periods are under review in relation to the menus and service levels available.



'TESTING THE WATER'

The process of 'testing the water' in relation to outsourcing the food and beverage service was ultimately unsuccessful. Artistic Catering was the successful tenderer and moved into final stages of detailed contract negotiations. Very unexpectedly and without warning Artistic Catering withdrew without explanation. The Club extends thanks to member Ian Barclay for the considerable time and effort put into this process.

NEXT STEPS

The Club continues to provide 'in-house' food and beverage services with the support of our new agency chef who is giving excellent service. Your Committee is now developing further strategies and options in relation to providing an affordable food and beverage service that is well supported by members and targeted to a broader member need. We ask for member patience, consideration and support as we move to improve the financial performance of these member service activities.



ASSIST THE PROCESS

Your House and Social Sub-committee is receptive to all member comment and suggestion to assist the period of change in our operation. We seek member input.


A small working group of four or five persons met regularly from October 2016 to April 2017. Archive storage- the first visit to the storage container was most disappointing. The container was in poor condition, with dusty shelves, the floor dirty and wet, and water damage to stored photos.

An OHS incident report was made to club management about the leaking roof of the container which had caused an electric shock when the lights in the container were turned on. The power to the container was turned off and the roof subsequently repaired.



Achievements to date: Storage container tidied, boxes and photos relocated onto dry shelves. Minute books saved from the 1970 fire have been catalogued and stored on shelves E 1 to E4. Commodore Michael McLean passed onto the Archives sub-committee a request for information from Bruce Stannard, who was writing the history of the Royal Prince Alfred Yacht Club, Sydney.

Two trophies donated to the club Archives had been awarded in 1938 to crew on Heather and on Vanessa in 1939. Photos of yacht Vanessa taken in 1938 were donated.

Off The Beach (OTB)

The off the beach (OTB) division of RYCV might seem to sit off to the side of the main part of the club, but serves a crucial role as the entry point of young blood into the club. In addition OTB engages with families and parents often initiate an engagement with sailing and our club through their association with the OTB division. The OTB needs large numbers of parent volunteers to function and many extend their voluntary work into keelboat activities as their children graduate into the senior rank.

The 2016 – 2017 season was very successful for the off the beach division. Among the juniors, all the International Cadets boats that were active last season returned, but some in the hands of new crews. Four additional Cadets joined the racing this season and this increased the activity on the water and on shore.. The parents of graduating Cadet crews should be acknowledged for passing the better boats in our fleet onto RYCV junior families without seeking any (or excessive) profit.

Royals continues to be a strong supporter of OTB sailing with participation across a variety of classes including International Cadets, Laser 4.7s, radials and full rigs plus 29ers to provide some high speed skiff excitement for the young and not so young. The OTB committee is determined to grow the fleet and several initiatives are being undertaken to try and boost participation and membership. This has included some "come try sailing" and information sessions for potential members and their parents. On August 27th we hosted an information session on the coldest and windiest day of the winter that was attended by 12 new families representing 16 potential junior members. Some younger kids will begin their sailing journey by doing the Tackers programs run by the Sailing Academy during the school holidays. Several kids who have completed the Tackers program were referred to the OTB group by Ian Fox and some have already found crew places in a Cadet for the summer racing season. Last summer Tim Olding ran some introductory sailing activities on Sunday mornings in the club Pacers. Among the new crew were children of some Cadet sailors from days gone by. It is great to see this intergenerational support for the Cadet class. It has really stood the test of time.

Cadet Class

The Cadets received excellent coaching from Liam Robertson who travelled up from Geelong with all the wisdom from his mentor, Australian Team coach Tony Bull.

This years Cadet Club racing series was dominated by *Spitfire* that was skippered by Peter Allen and new crew, Oliver Grieve, whose father Ryan Grieve was a former Australian Cadet National Champion.

Peter Allen and Oliver Grieve in won the club aggregate, the club championship and all the available scratch trophies for skipper and crew, except the Jan trophy that was won by Peter Allens' former skipper, Louis Schofield who sailed *Sidewinder* with his young sister Ava as his crew.

The best new skipper was Mats Maertens, who also won all the trophies in the second division, sailing *Supersonic* with crew Megan Dymalovski.

This year's National Championships were hosted by Largs Bay Sailing Club and the racing was conducted in challenging and variable conditions off the Port Adelaide beaches.

Six Royals boats made the trek including Spitfire, Sidewinder, Bullant, Jonathon L, R&R, and Supersonic. Best performing Royals boat was Spitfire in 12th overall, including a first place in race 7, followed by Sidewinder (15th) including a third place in race 7, Bullant (43), Jonathon L (66), R&R (69) and Supersonic in 71st with skipper Mats Maertens taking the trophy for the top ranked under 12 skipper. The result from *Spitfire* saw them selected as the 8th boat in the Australian team to go to the world championships at Bruinesse in the Netherlands. Skipper Peter Allen and crew Oliver Grieve performed exceptionally well in the Promotional fleet regatta taking three 1st places and coming 3rd overall.

All RYCV boats improved in the rankings in our state based club competitions, and particularly at the State championships that were run at Sandringham Yacht Club. Notable results were from *Spitfire* (Peter Allen and Oliver Grieve) who was 3rd overall and *Bullant* (Ned Peace and Carla Maertens) who was 6th overall.

During the year some of our more senior Cadet sailors moved on and are now actively sailing 29ers including last year's Cadet club champion, Clare Olding, joining with Olivia Neilson from RGYC in the Victorian sailing team. Also Louis Schofield continued crewing for ex Cadet world champion Tom Alexander (RGYC) now in a 49er also as member of the Victorian Sailing Team.

Senior OTB

Nine senior boats entered the 16/17 summer season. This was one fewer than last year and seven fewer than the preceding season. Classes in the senior OTB included Lasers of various rig sizes, some people using the club Pacers and 29ers. It is fair to say that the racing on the seniors is a practised to a lesser degree of seriousness than the Cadets, and represents the demographic. Governance Sub-Committee

The Governance Sub-Committee was formed as a new sub-committee after the last AGM to assist in upgrading the processes and practices around management of the Club and to ensure we addressed all out legal, statutory, financial, community and moral obligations. This is a very significant task and I would like to thank my co-members, John Boyle, Peter Botica and Michael McLean for their work with the sub-committee.

As a first step we put in place a Governance calendar to ensure that the critical elements of the Clubs operation were addressed by the General Committee at appropriate intervals during the year. The list of items for focused review is extensive and to provide a couple of examples , the calendar ensures that the General Committee reviews safety performance, procedures and policies, manages the staff review and remuneration process effectively and fairly, and ensures a timely financial planning and reporting process.

Transparency of operation and decision making is critical for good governance and addressing this facet of our practice has been a priority. We have increased communications from General Committee, and provided sessions for member input, as well as maximising the use of existing channels of communications such as Enews to improve transparency and communications.

Another major task has been the revision and review of the Rules and By-Laws. Legislation was passed in 2012 requiring Associations to upgrade their Rules or adopt the "model" rules. We have a Special Resolution before the AGM to adopt the new rules after significant opportunity for members to propose amendments and participate in the Rules information Session held on August 19th.

Along with revision of policies and practices across the Club the Governance sub-committee has been working with the other sub-Committees to put in place Terms of Reference for each Sub-committee and for them to develop strategic goals and plans for the coming year. These will build up to a strategic plan for the Club. The two planning sessions, one for sub-committees, and one for members, were important in getting everyone on the same page.

With all the work we have done, there is still much more to do, and as we move in to the next term we hope to bed in the improved practices and processes so the overall performance of the Club will continue to improve. At the start of the term there were a number of issues that needed to be addressed urgently and the general committee took immediate steps to change the Club's practices to meet minimum standards of operation. With these in place and the changes made we will continue to work to ensure that RYCV is a Club of which members can be proud and a Club that is recognized positively in the community in which we operate.

The overall result was unfavourable compared with the prior year with major differences in income and expenses being:

- House Trading result improved \$64k. Although Bar & Catering sales were down by \$131k, costs were contained with wages down \$145k. The committee and management are investigating ways to improve both the sales and overall performance of this area, which has been suffering losses since the Club began catering in-house in 2008.
- Marina revenue improved \$137k. New Marina rates applied in the current year. Marina Maintenance increased\$74k. Much needed maintenance has been required on the marina, which had been held over in recent years, in anticipation of building the Floating Marina sooner. Some work has been charged to the maintenance account and some major piling works have been capitalised, to be amortised over five years.
- Yard Income decreased \$46k although Travel Lift income was largely unaffected, other yard income, was down.
- Racing Revenue was down \$20k. Entry Fee Income and Income from charges to other Clubs for their use of our equipment and people was noticeably down.
- Royals Training centre was down \$8k while expenses were down \$17k.
- Donations Received were down by \$227k. The prior year donations included the final \$200k contribution from Mr. Nigel Peck for the then planned new Clubhouse.
- Provision for Doubtful Debts was increased by \$100k, which should have been higher in recent years. Outstanding debts remain a major concern. This provision takes account of a number of members owing significant amounts. The current Committee and Management are taking a tougher line on Members with outstanding accounts.
- Depreciation increased by \$187k. This mainly relates to accelerated depreciation of the existing piled marina to be written down over five years, when it is expected that the proposed floating marina is completed.
- Total employment costs for Club favourable by \$220k.

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial report covers Royal Yacht Club of Victoria as an individual entity. Royal Yacht Club of Victoria Incorporated is an association incorporated in Victoria under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Vic).

The financial report is a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations and the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 (Vic). Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in a financial report containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions to which they apply. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of this financial report are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

(a) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first-in first-out basis.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset as follows:

Plant and equipment - over 2 to 15 years

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by the Committee to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed as the higher of fair value less costs to sell or its value in use.

The Committee have reviewed the effective life of expenditure incurred in respect of the new Floating Marina project. Due to financial constraints, it is considered this project may not proceed in its original concept and is likely to undergo a phased implementation over a longer term. In view of this development, the Committee have adopted an accelerated rate of depreciation on the existing piled marina (20% straight line per annum) commencing with the 2017 year. This has resulted in an increased depreciation charge of \$110,339 for the 2017 year. Similarly, the Committee has also reviewed the effective life of expenditure for the new Western Hardstand area and have resolved to adopt a depreciation rate of 5% (straight line per annum) commencing with the 2017 year. This has resulted in an additional depreciation charge of \$34,760 for the 2017 year.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Con't)

(c) Cash

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand, at banks and on deposit net of bank overdrafts.

(d) Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for benefits accruing to employees in respect of wages and salaries, annual leave, long service leave and other employee benefits when it is probable that settlement will be required and they are capable of being measured reliably.

Wages and salaries, annual leave, long service leave and other employee benefits expected to be settled within 12 months, are measured at their nominal values using the remuneration rate expected to apply at the time of settlement.

Long service leave and other employee benefits which are not expected to be settled within 12 months are measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made by the entity in respect of services provided by employees up to reporting date.

Superannuation Guarantee Charge

The club pays the Superannuation Guarantee Charge (SGC) to superannuation schemes as required under applicable legislation.

(e) Income Tax

The club is exempt from Income Tax.

(f) Revenue

Sale of Goods: Revenue from the sale of goods (food, beverages, clothing and other items) is recognised at the point of sale when it is probable the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the club and the amount of the revenue can be reliably measured.

Rendering of Services: Revenue from members' subscriptions and rental of marina space are recognised at the point of service to the member or customer when it is probable the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the club and the amount of the revenue can be reliably measured.

Deferred and unearned revenue: The Club receives revenue in advance from members and customers. These amounts are recorded as liabilities until such time as the requirements of the clubs revenue recognition criteria have been met at which time the amounts are reclassified to revenue.

Finance Income: Interest income is recognised on a time proportionate basis that takes into account the effective yield on the financial asset.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Con't)

(g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the Statement of Financial Position are shown inclusive of GST.

(h) Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the Club assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. The assessment will include considering external sources of information and internal sources of information. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount. Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease.

For an asset that does not generate largely independent cash inflows, the recoverable amount is determined for the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

(d) Impairment Losses

2017 - New Club House Development

The total impairment loss recognised in profit and loss during the period amounted to \$ 305,732. The impairment loss is separately recognised in the statement of profit or loss as impairment of property, plant and equipment. During the 2016 year, the Club incurred preliminary costs relating to a proposed clubhouse redevelopment project the viability of which was largely dependent on a significant donation pledged by a member.

During the 2017 year, the donation pledge has been withdrawn. In view of the consequent financial constraints of the development, the Committee have resolved to defer this project indefinitely.

During the 2017 year, the committee has undertaken a review of the carrying value of this project to date compared to its value in use to the Club. Arising from this review, the committee has identified that there is no ongoing value in use to the Club of the preliminary works and costs to date. Accordingly, an impairment loss of \$305,732 has been incurred and charged to profit and loss during the 2017 year.

2016 - New Western Hardstand area/Platform Lift

The 2016 comparative figure loss of \$1,022,690 reflect impairment losses in relation to the New Western Hardstand area/Platform Lift as charged in that year and as described in the 2016 financial statements.

The Club is currently finalising a proposal for members to replace the current marina with a floating marina, this includes an expansion to the current number of berths and improved facilities for club members. It is proposed the funding for this project will be in the form of external finance. Prior to the 31st May 2017, the club has received prepaid marina license/fees amounting to \$322,727.00 (exc. GST). These prepaid amounts are voluntary payments on the part of members to assist the club in the preliminary costs of evaluation of the project. If the project is adopted by members then these prepayments will be attributed as license fees relating to the new marina. Should the project not proceed, these prepayments will be treated as contributions towards current club membership/marina fees over several years to ensure adequate cash flow for the Club.

(ii) Club House Development

Due to the withdrawal of pledged funding for this project during the 2017 year, the Committee have resolved to defer this project indefinitely. Arising from this deferral the Committee have assessed the value of preliminary costs to date and have resolved to recognise an impairment loss as during the 2017 year of \$ 305,732 (as per Note 9d of these financial statements)
