On the field there has been some exciting developments over the past few weeks. The McDonalds regional Cup has begun with four teams from South West, Hampden, Wimmera and Ballarat regions taking part in trial game at Ararat over two weeks. These games will be used to select those players who will take part in the V-Line under-15 championships to be held in Gippsland later this year. As is always the case, players have thoroughly enjoyed this series of matches and we have seen some terrific play. A real positive has been a huge increase in girls from throughout the region putting their hand up to try out for the girls' under-15 squad, the Western Rebels. Girls' football is a huge opportunity in our region and finally the hard work of Alan Thompson, Jock Whiting, Alicia Drew, and Peter Allen is reaping some rewards. We look forward to seeing this continued growth and a great team represent our region at the championships.

Finally I would like to offer the condolences of the Commission to the family and friends of Philip Walsh after his tragic passing last week. Philip is a Hamilton local and represented the Hamilton Football Club before moving to Collingwood in the early 1980s. While it has been a long time since
